*In case you missed it,* Dan Edwards, a powerhouse in media and communication, spoke to us last month about Body Language. He is a graduate of the



prestigious **Body Language Institute** in Washington, D.C., and one of the nation's rare Master-Certified Professional Development speakers, an expert in decoding and teaching the **Science of Body Language** to help others lead, influence, and connect with impact.

Learning body language is important to people in nonprofit organizations because it enhances communication, strengthens relationships, and increases the effectiveness of outreach and leadership. Here's why:

- 1. <u>Builds Trust and Connection</u> Nonprofits often rely on community engagement, donor relations, and volunteer coordination. Understanding body language helps staff and leaders appear approachable, sincere, and confident, which builds trust with stakeholders.
- 2. <u>Improves Communication</u> A large portion of communication is nonverbal. Being able to read cues such as eye contact, posture, and facial expressions allows nonprofit professionals to gauge interest, confusion, or discomfort, and adjust their message accordingly.
- 3. <u>Enhances Fundraising and Advocacy</u> Interpersonal interactions during fundraising appeals or advocacy efforts are more successful when the speaker can effectively project confidence, empathy, and passion—often communicated through nonverbal behavior.
- 4. <u>Strengthens Team Dynamics</u> Understanding body language helps in resolving conflicts, motivating volunteers, and fostering a positive work environment by recognizing when team members may be stressed, disengaged, or need support.
- 5. <u>Boosts Public Speaking and Leadership Presence</u> Leaders in nonprofit settings often speak at events, lead meetings, or appear in public. Strong, confident body language improves their presence and influence.

#### Celebrating 250 Years of History of Women in the Military

Women have served with, and in, the military since the Revolutionary War, although until World War I, they were many times forced to disguise their true identity. Once America entered the "War to end all wars" women were finally allowed to serve as clerks, radio operators and telephone swithc board operators. More women joined the military as nurses during this time as well. With the attack on Pearl Harbor the role of women in the military exploded, with women now flying aircraft, serving as instructors, and ultimately workingh on Top Secret projects such as the "Bombe" decoding machine developed and built in Dayton.

With the Korean War and Vietnam War, the role of women continued to expland to a certain degree. However, while there were women's organizations as part of the military (WACs, WAVES, and WAFs) they were not allowed to serve in combat or command men. Pregnancy was the cause for involuntary discharge.

By the end of the Vietnam War, many of these restrictions were lifted, with the exception of the ability to serve in combat roles. This was essentially a moot point as the nature of warfare began to change. From the invasion of Panama and Grenada to Operation DESERT STORM women took on leadership roles in combat, even though technically not allowed to do so.

After September 11th, virtually all restrictions for female service members were done away with. In environments where there are essentially no front lines, and dealing with insurgencies made any such restriction useless.

Throughout the past 250 years women have gone from serving in secret to leading their services as 4-star Generals and Flag Officers; their journey fraught with stereotypes, chauvinism, and at times plain ignorance. They've overcome these obstacles and shown they have always been up to the task of preserving and defending the freedoms we all enjoy today.
